UPK/Preschool

Bruins and Patriots: Unit 1 Continued- Together in Our Community

This unit encourages children and teachers to build the foundation for a strong community of learners—developing caring and respectful relationships and routines and expectations for how we all work together in the classroom. From the first day of school, children and adults share experiences through storytelling and play, exploring what it means to be in school, as well as understanding the importance of feelings, identity, family, and community. They develop shared ways of interacting, solving problems, and creating together.

Big Ideas:

• Each of us is an important part of the community. Our families are part of the community. We each make contributions to the community. In our community, we do things together and share ideas. We all have ways of communicating.

Maple, Celtics, and Red Sox: Unit 1 Continued-Family and Friends

In this unit, children will learn to think about the concept of family while they also begin to form friendships with peers. They're learning that families and friends may share similarities while also having differences. Additionally, families and friends can collaborate to care for one another, communicate feelings, solve problems, and resolve conflicts. Children come to understand that a community is a group of people who live, work, or engage in activities together.

Big Ideas:

A family is a group of unique individuals who care for and support each other. A friend is someone we
care for and want to spend time with. Shared experiences build connections and identities. Families
and friends can be alike in some ways and different in others.

Exploration Unit Continued- All about us

In the first unit of the Learning Through Exploration curriculum, children will learn about themselves and each other in the context of their classroom community.

All About Us offers educators a chance to intentionally build community in the first weeks of the school year. The focus will be on getting to know one another, affirming children's individual identities, strengthening relationships, and laying the foundation for social and emotional skills which will be built on and encouraged year-round. It is also an opportunity to engage mindfully with the anti-bias goals of the curriculum by reflecting on the connections between all members of the community and the importance of caring for one another.

Big Questions:

• What is a community? Who are the people in our classroom? How are we similar? How are we different? How do people take care of each other? Who takes care of us? What kinds of feelings do we feel? How do people talk about their feelings?

Infants

Our youngest scholars will be growing and learning so much!

You will be receiving your child's **individual curriculum** so you can try the activities they are doing in the classroom at home. Throughout the month the teachers will provide activities and record your baby's responses.

Infant Reminders:

- EEC requires all children to have something on their feet. Please make sure your baby has socks, booties, or shoes to wear in the classrooms.
- Please make sure your child has a daily, labeled, supply of sippy cups or bottles for every feeding. These will be sent home daily for cleaning.

Social Emotional Development

As the new school year begins the children in all of our rooms will be identifying their emotions and learning how to express their feelings. We will also focus on feelings of others to aid in developing empathy.

- 1. Please ensure your children have extra, seasonally appropriate clothing in their cubby.
- 2. Please send in some photos of your child's family and friends so we can post them in the classroom.
- 3. Please wash your child's hands upon entering the classroom.
- 4. Please arrive no later than 9:15 each day. Late arrivals disrupt the classroom and curriculum.
- 5. Please remember to fold your carriages and place them in the carriage parking area.






It's Developmental Screening Time!

Positive Behavior Support (PBS) at Home Series by Liz Muscolino, M.Ed., EdS UPK Behavioral Health Services Liaison

What Is Positive Behavior Support (PBS) and why should I care?

Positive Behavior support, or PBS, is an approach to interacting with children that has been shown to improve child behaviors and adult feelings of well-being. All behavior is communication. When we acknowledge our child's behavior, even behaviors like tantruming, as communication, we can move away from snap judgements and knee-jerk reactions and start to use every situation, no matter how unpleasant, as an opportunity to support a "child's capacity to love, trust, explore and learn". Although most parents (91% from a large, diverse sample) find parenting to be a source of great joy, they also report having many questions about child-rearing practices. PBS, Responsive Caregiving, and Positive Parenting can offer some answers on the journey of parenthood. Each month in this year's family newsletter, we will share, review, and provide examples of one of the nine key elements of Positive Parenting.

Notice and celebrate your child's strengths, abilities, and capacity to learn and develop

Element description: This element of Positive Parenting is all about taking moments to notice who your child really is and celebrate whatever you find. Is your child someone who boldly explores new places and gets into everything? Is your child someone who likes to stay close to familiar people until he gets comfortable? There are lots of qualities that may be easy to celebrate. It may be easy to celebrate that your child is curious with toys or sensitive to the feelings of others. There are also lots of qualities that may be difficult to find a positive perspective on. No matter what qualities we see when we make observations about our children, we can find something positive to celebrate. Celebrating who our children are can be a great opportunity to stretch our creative muscles.

Ideas for using this in everyday moments: Notice that your child bosses other children around? A positive perspective may be that they are a natural leader. Notice that your child cries a lot? A positive perspective may be that they are really expressing how they feel! Notice that your child touches everything? A positive perspective may be that she is curious about how things work.

This school year, Ellis is continuing its partnership with <u>The Housman institute</u>, an early childhood education training, professional development, curriculum, and research organization that promotes the development of emotional intelligence from birth.

In this partnership, our staff will be a part of the research-based <u>begin to ECSEL</u> (Emotional, Cognitive, and Social Early Learning) Educator Training Program. Teachers and administrators will take courses and work with Housman Institute Coaches to teach children how to effectively identify, understand, express, and regulate their big emotions.



The program teaches educators and children to:

- Understand the cause and effect of emotions
- Develop empathy and prosocial skills
- Gain problem-solving and conflict resolution skills to support healthy development, emotional well-being, and academic success

You, as your child's first teacher, will be working together with their classroom teachers to ensure collaborative communication continues in the best interest of your child's ongoing growth and development.



Throughout the year, our team will complete ECSEL courses and receive ongoing support and feedback from ECSEL coaches. We will utilize ECSEL language, tools, and techniques in our classrooms with your children. We will continue to provide families with updates and additional information in the coming weeks.
